Treasury Report Update



The March 2018 Treasury Report is available on the City's website at: www.newportbeachca.gov/treasury.

As of March, the City's portfolio totaled just over \$258 million, from all sources. Roughly \$33 million of this portfolio was highly liquid, meaning it was available for cash flows associated with day-to-day operations and cash funding of major construction expenditures.

The short-term portfolio (\$194 million) had a weighted average effective maturity of 1.712 years. With

interest rates on the rise, the total return for the short-term portfolio was suppressed by unrealized losses from the declining market value of bonds (bond values move inversely to the direction of interest rates). Including these unrealized losses, the trailing twelve month's total return was 0.46%. This return compared favorably to our benchmark for the same period, the BAML 1-3 Year Treasury index, which returned 0.03%. The income yield on the portfolio, a better measure of income derived from the portfolio, was 1.45%.

TRAINING

The fire department hosted a state certified Open Water Rescue class for Fire and Lifeguard personnel. Sniffing & Sneezing? Rid Your Home of Allergens



Follow these basic steps to keep your home free of allergens:

- **Beds:** Use an anti-allergy mattress cover, duvet and pillow casings and frequently wash your bedding and curtains in hot water.
- **Pets:** Keep pets off furniture and out of your bedroom.
- **Refrigerator:** Make sure you wipe down your refrigerator, especially the corners, to ensure that no mold is growing.
- **Shoes:** Take your shoes off at the door; wearing shoes in your home can track in pollen and other allergens.
- **Decor:** Keep your decorations minimal and dust frequently. Don't forget about wall décor! Picture frames, clocks and other items on the wall also gather dust.
- **Shower:** Regularly clean your bathtub or shower to remove mold from both the tile and curtain.
- **Rugs:** Frequently vacuum rugs and carpet. Choose rugs that can be washed if necessary.
- **Humidity:** To decrease the possibility of mold, consider using a dehumidifier to reduce indoor humidity.

The 10 Principles of Listening

A good listener will listen not only to what is being said, but also to what is left unsaid or only partially said. Effective listening therefore involves observing body language and noticing inconsistencies between verbal and non-verbal messages, as well as just what is being said at any given moment. Listening is therefore not just a matter of using your ears, but also your eyes. There are ten principles behind good listening.



1. **Stop Talking -** Don't talk, listen.

If we were supposed to talk more than we listen, we would have two tongues and one ear. When the other person has finished talking you may need to clarify to ensure you have received their message accurately.

2. Prepare Yourself to Listen - Relax.

Focus on the speaker. Put other things out of mind. The human mind is easily distracted by other thoughts – what's for lunch, what time do I need to leave to catch my bus, is it going to rain – try to put other thoughts out of mind and concentrate on the messages that are being communicated.

3. **Put the Speaker at Ease** - Help the speaker to feel free to speak.

Remember their needs and concerns. Nod or use other gestures or words to encourage them to continue. Maintain eye contact but do not stare – show you are listening and understanding what is being said.

4. Remove Distractions - Focus on what is being said.

Do not doodle, shuffle papers, look out the window, pick your fingernails or similar. Avoid unnecessary interruptions. These behaviors disrupt the listening process and send messages to the speaker that you are bored or distracted.

5. **Empathize** - Try to understand the other person's point of view.

Look at issues from their perspective. Let go of preconceived ideas. By having an open mind we can more fully empathize with the speaker. If the speaker says something that you disagree with, wait and construct an argument to counter what is said but keep an open mind to the views and opinions of others.

6. **Be Patient** - A pause, even a long pause, does not necessarily mean that the speaker has finished. Be patient and let the speaker continue in their own time; sometimes it takes time to formulate what to say and how to say it. Never interrupt or finish a sentence for someone.

7. Avoid Personal Prejudice - Try to be impartial.

Do not become irritated and don't let the person's habits or mannerisms distract you from what the speaker is really saying. Everybody has a different way of speaking - some people are for example more nervous or shy than others, some have regional accents or make excessive arm movements, some people like to pace whilst talking - others like to sit still. Focus on what is being said and try to ignore styles of delivery.

8. Listen to the Tone - Volume and tone both add to what someone is saying.

A good speaker will use both volume and tone to their advantage to keep an audience attentive; everybody will use pitch, tone and volume of voice in certain situations.

9. Listen for Ideas – Not Just Words

You need to get the whole picture, not just isolated bits and pieces. Maybe one of the most difficult aspects of listening is the ability to link together pieces of information to reveal the ideas of others.

10. Wait and Watch for Non-Verbal Communication

Gestures, facial expressions, and eye-movements can all be important. We don't just listen with our ears but also with our eyes – watch and pick up the additional information being transmitted via non-verbal communication.



Mandatory Harassment Prevention Training



While California law requires that all employees with supervisory responsibility attend a two-hour Harassment Prevention training every two years, Human Resources recommends that all employees receive this important training and offers several sessions during the year. We have found the information to be beneficial for employees in their interactions with coworkers and the public.

Thirty-nine (39) employees attended the workshop held on Saturday, April 28, at Marina Park. This interactive training was presented by Christopher Frederick, an attorney from Liebert Cassidy Whitmore and included an overview of the following topics:

- Laws related to discrimination, harassment and retaliation
- Protected classifications
- Bullying/Abusive conduct in the workplace
- Types of harassment
- Duties of a supervisor
- Review of the City's Discrimination and Harassment Prevention Policy

Moving a Lifeguard Tower

There are approximately 30 lifeguard towers from Corona del Mar to the Santa Ana River Jetty. The Field Maintenance Division works closely with the Lifeguard Division throughout the year in scheduling replacements and movements of the towers. Recently, the Lifeguard Division requested to move a tower from the Lifeguard Station at the Newport Pier to Corona Del Mar State Beach.



Additionally, in preparation for the winter season, the towers are pulled away from the shoreline to prevent damage from high surf. Near the beginning of the summer, the towers are moved closer to the shoreline, providing a better view of the swimmers. Beach Maintenance staff is currently in the process of getting the towers located for summer.

A FOCUS ON TRAFFIC SAFETY

May is a busy month for traffic safety topics. We are observing National Bicycle Safety Month, National Motorcycle Safety Month *and* Click It or Ticket Month. Here are some tips to keep everyone safer on the road.

Good bike safety habits:

- Be predictable when riding
- Wear a helmet and eye protection
- Wear bright colored clothing
- Carry identification
- Obey all traffic laws
- Ride with traffic
- Ride in the bicycle lane (whenever possible)
- Ride to the furthest right as can be safely done (when traveling at a lower speed than automobile traffic)
- Use hand signals
- Use a front head lamp and a red tail lamp at night
- Ride with both hands on the handle bars
- Maintain and clean your bicycle often





And, last but not least, the "Click It or Ticket" campaign is a reminder that some of the best traffic safety tips are also the most basic ones. Buckle up, every time you get behind the wheel. It's the single greatest defense you have if you are in a traffic collision.

This month, and always, the NBPD would like to remind everyone who lives, works or plays in Newport Beach that traffic safety is everyone's responsibility. Let's all work together to keep our streets safe for everyone who uses them.

Safety tips for motorcycle riders: See and be seen

- Use your lane position to increase visibility; change lanes only when there is ample room
- Match your speed to surrounding traffic
- Always wear a DOT-compliant helmet and brightly-colored protective clothing
- Ride with lights on, even during daylight hours



DISTINGUISHED SPEAKER: HUGH HEWITT

On Friday, April 20, the NBPD had the pleasure of hosting Hugh Hewitt for the latest installment of our Distinguished Leaders Series. As a lawyer and professor, Mr. Hewitt has had tremendous opportunities to view leadership in practice. And, as a broadcast journalist, he has interviewed thousands of leaders over the years.

Of the many men and women Hugh has encountered in his career, he listed several extraordinary leaders whom he felt were the most influential to him. This list included presidents of the United States, other American politicians and business and media leaders.

Mr. Hewitt noted that, although these leaders are all different people, spanning the political spectrum and coming from different sectors of the county, they all have several traits in common:

> 1. They provide clear direction to their subordinates, in private. Their subordinates don't have to guess what they want done. These leaders may need to communicate in general terms while in public, but in private, they are always clear



and direct in their communications (whether verbally or in writing).

- 2. They don't take offense or take things personally. When mistakes are made or insulting things are said, good leaders are diplomatic and easy-going in their approach to addressing an issue.
- 3. They are always optimistic and encourage others. These leaders are positive to a fault and are always quick with a compliment or some encouraging word.
- 4. They are very loyal and they take an interest in mentoring others. Some leadership positions are not conducive to mentorship, as singling out a particular person can be seen as "playing favorites". But, where acceptable, these leaders always take an interest in developing others... especially the next generation. They like to seek out and help inexperienced and talented young people who are just starting out in their careers.
- 5. They are respectful and do not engage in coarse or reckless speech. In an era of "trash talking," good leaders are the exception. They are not prone to pointing out the faults of others or talking ill of them.
- 6. They are generous and have a good sense of humor. These two traits are symbiotic and ever-present. These leaders are always generous (to a fault) and are quick to laugh or tell a joke.
- 7. **They are voracious readers.** This is not limited to just the classics; they are well-read in many different subject matters, both fiction and non-fiction.

I am grateful that Mr. Hewitt took the time to share these valuable insights with our staff.

SCAM ALERT: KIDNAPPING SCAMS

Have you heard of "Kidnapping Scams"? Here's how they work:

You get a call saying that a loved one has been kidnapped. The caller may make

threats, demand money or lead you to believe that your loved one is in danger.

But... is the caller who you think it is? Scammers are good at pretending to be someone they're not. They can be convincing: sometimes using information from social networking sites or hacking into email accounts to make it seem more real. And they'll pressure you to send money before you have time to think.



Here's what you can do:

- 1. **Stop. Check it out.** Try to contact the loved one who you are concerned about, or call friends or another family member.
- 2. **Keep your information (and your money) safe.** Never give out personal identifying information, such as bank account or credit card account numbers, to anyone you do not know. And never send money to an unknown person.
- 3. **Pass this information on to a friend.** You may not have received one of these calls, but chances are that you know someone who will—if they haven't already.

Newport Elementary Field Rehabilitation

Great progress is happening on the work required to regrade the field and construct a new seating wall around the field. Construction began April 16 while school was out for Spring Break. All work will be completed before Memorial Day weekend. Maintenance of the new sod will continue through the summer. The field will be reopen for students and the public this fall.





Balboa Island Seawall Cap Completed

A nine-inch cap added to the existing wall around Balboa Island has now been constructed on 7000 feet of seawall along North and South Bayfront. With the taller wall, additional protection is given from future flooding due to overtopping of seawalls during high tides and storm events. Keen eyes may note that there is a gap in the seawall located at street ends to permit easier

access to the beach. When high tide events are forecast, Utility Operations will insert stop boards at these gaps when high water levels are



expected and remove them once water surface levels return to normal. In addition



to installing the new cap, cracked sidewalks along North Bayfront (between Agate and Pearl Avenues) and South Bayfront (between Park and Emerald Avenues) will be replaced. This work will be completed by May 25. Many thanks to the community for working with the City's contractor to facilitate installation of these improvements along this treasured walkway!

New Weather Station Installed at Bonita Canyon Sports Park

To gather accurate weather data, Public Works recently installed a weather station at Bonita Canyon Sports Park between fields 1 and 2. The data will be useful to thousands of public and private irrigation systems citywide.

You can view the data at

http://newportbeach.westernweathergroup.com. The automated weather station measures air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed, wind direction, rainfall, solar radiation and soil temperature.

The station collects weather conditions every 15 minutes, hourly and daily. The information gathered allows for weather based or "smart" irrigation controllers to apply water to landscapes in a much more efficient way. This localized weather data allows irrigation controllers to apply the water plants need to remain healthy while not being overwatered.
