VI. CURRENT BUSINESS

A. Newport Island Park Rehabilitation Project Review

Provide input on the concept plan for the rehabilitation project of Newport Island Park and forward to City Council for final approval.

Senior Civil Engineer Arciniega presented a PowerPoint that reviewed the conceptual renovation plans for the Newport Island Park. He provided a brief description of the location of the park, and what amenities and current existing conditions were. He presented Option One and Option Two pertaining to upgrades proposed for the park, and the survey sent to surrounding neighbors requesting what option they preferred. He also updated the Commission on where the shed could be relocated to, maintenance of the existing sand, next steps and that all general information pertaining to the park was on the City website.

Senior Engineer Arciniega answered questions from the Commission pertaining to the March 13, 2019 community meeting, the survey, yearly maintenance costs for both options, the location of the shed, cats using the sand and maintenance of the sand, and relocation of the basketball court.

Chair Hayes opened the public comments.

Jim Miller stated that a lot of residents who lived on the island did not receive the survey. He reviewed findings made by the Center of Disease Control and Prevention discussing cat feces. He noted that he was not supportive of keeping the sand located at the tot lot and that the play equipment was broken.

Elisa Marcos was in favor of replacing all the existing sand with new sand and that the City continue to clean the sand three times a week.

Malinda Marcos stated that kids loved sand and did not want to see it removed.

Maryanna Marcos was in favor of keeping the sand at the tot lot and was not in support of using rubber matting.

Mason Marcos concurred that the sand was better because it did not cause injuries when kids fell down and wanted new sand, please.

Chair Howald closed the public comments.

Discussion commenced between staff and the Commission about the existing sand and maintenance, next steps, and the timeline of the project.

Motion by Commissioner Englebrecht; seconded by Commissioner Hayes to approve the concept plan (Option 1 – replace existing sand with new sand, and replace existing rubberized surfacing) for Newport Island Park rehabilitation project and moving the shed approximately 30-feet from Marcus Avenue and forward to City Council for final approval. Motion carried unanimously.

B. Reforestation Request – 301 Poppy Avenue

Consider the reforestation request of Michael Dilley, Landscape Architect for Ed and Lori Coss of two City Pine trees located at 301 Poppy Avenue and replaced with three 36" box Water Gum Trees. The applicant has met the procedural requirements for reforestation established by City Council Policy G-1. The applicant will assume all costs.

Urban Forester Pekar gave a brief description of the reforestation request. He went over his tree inspection and findings, what criteria the reforestation request qualified for, and why the newly proposed trees were smaller than a 48" box.

Vice Chair Granoff stated that he supported the idea of installing three trees instead of two.

Forester Pekar answered questions from the Commission about the newly proposed Gum trees and their appearance.

Chair Howald opened the public comment.

Michael Dilley, Landscape Architect, gave an explanation of why the Coss family wanted to remove the existing trees and why they chose the Water Gum trees as the replacement trees. Also, the Coss family was planning to add irrigation to the parkway in order to water the trees.

Chair Howald closed the public comment.

<u>Motion by Vice Chair Granoff, seconded by Commissioner Archer</u> to approve the reforestation request of Michael Dilley, Landscape Architect for Ed and Lori Coss of two City Pine trees located at 301 Poppy Avenue and replaced with three 36" box Water Gum Trees. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

C. Proposed Revisions to City Council Policy B-17 – Parks, Facilities, and Recreation Program Donation.

Consider proposed revisions to City Council Policy B-17 and forward to City Council for their review and approval.

Deputy Director Martin gave a presentation on the findings that were made by the Ad Hoc Committee regarding City Council Policy B-17. Significant changes include a limit on the donation period, the change to the maintenance fee for donated items, limit the types of benches that could be chosen for donation, all tree donations would be valued at the cost of a 48" box, tree donations would no longer be eligible for donation plaques, for benches the plaque size and wording would be based on the donation amount. He reviewed the website, which provided a donation map that showed the existing inventory the City had pertaining to donated items.

Chair Howald commented that Deputy Director Martin had done a good job conveying what the Ad Hoc Committee had felt was necessary.

Deputy Director Martin addressed questions from the Commission about costs of donations, plaque sizes, how staff would notify residents that already held donated items of the updated policy, the process on how future applications would be processed, how old, existing donations would be handled, existing inventory, maintenance fees, and what the process was for donating a water fountain.

Commissioner Englebrecht suggested adding a renewal fee for existing donations if the donor wished to keep the location of their donated item after their 10-year life span was up. He suggested that existing donors pay another maintenance fee that would cover their donated items for the next 10-years. He commented on his dislike for the stone benches that were available for selection as a donated item. He requested that staff explore more comfortable benches and have those benches be available for selection.

Vice Chair Granoff announced that the Ad Hoc Committee had a long discussion about what benches would be made available going forward and also fees.

Chair Howald opened the public comment.

Jim Mosher asked for clarification on the change of the maintenance fees, maintenance costs for trees, and clarification on how the changeover process would be after a donated item reached its 10-year life span. He advised staff that the B-17 Policy as amended needed more work in order to make it clear.

Chair Howald closed the public comment.

Commissioner Ignatin expressed that it was important that the policy have clear guidelines and that they are applied consistently.

Motion by Commissioner Hayes, seconded by Vice Chair Granoff to forward the proposed revisions of City Council Policy B-17 and forward to City Council for their review and approval. Motion carries by unanimous vote.

Deputy Director Levin disclosed that upcoming event for April included the Mayor's Egg Roll on April 13, 2019, the Special Olympics Basketball Tournament on April 20, 2019, and on April 26, 2019, was the Youth Track and Field Night at Newport Harbor High School.

Deputy Director Martin gave a follow up to the Commission pertaining to the public notice that homeowners would receive about the Magnolia Pest Alert, an overview of the map that included where all the landmark trees were located within the City, and that traffic advisories were posted on the OASIS bulletin board.

Urban Forester Pekar announced that a biocontrol was going to be conducted on the worst affected areas of the Tulip Tree Scale.

Chair Howald presented a Certificate of Recognition to Landscape Manager Dan Sereno on his retirement. Landscape Manager Sereno gave a closing speech.

VIII. PUBLIC COMMENTS ON NON-AGENDA ITEMS

Jim Mosher announced his congratulations to Dan Sereno and his retirement. He expressed that the G-1 Policy contained a list of dedicated trees and he advised that there be a future discussion about that list of trees at a future meeting.

Beach Maintenance

Mid-April, a large amount of tar has washed up on the beach from the River Jetty to the Newport Pier areas, from an unknown source. The last time tar washed up on our beach was in 2016. Generally, it takes about three weeks to clean the beach of tar.

Organic Pest Control Strategy in Corona Del Mar with use of Beneficial Insects

The City of Newport Beach implemented an experimental trial to our Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Program last week. City Pest Management Contractor, RPW Services Inc., released hundreds of adult predatory beetles and thousands of lacewing eggs to City Magnolia trees in the Corona Del Mar area to combat an invasive pest, the Tulip Tree Scale. Scale are insects that use their piercing-sucking mouthparts to feed on shoots and stems of leaves and branches. The result, a sticky honeydew (the scientific term for excrement) drops profusely to walking surfaces and the cars below. As the honeydew accumulates on lower leaves, Sooty Mold (a black-looking fungus) begins to grow on it, which results in the tree's inability to photosynthesize. This causes the tree to stress, decline and occasionally die.

Green Lacewings and Scale Destroyer insects are known as beneficial insects that feed on Tulip Tree Scale. The use of beneficial organisms is one of the several tools in the City's IPM program. If the use of these beneficial insects proves successful, we will be able to reduce the need pesticides, another IPM tool, to combat the Tulip Tree Scale. Additionally, as these beneficial insects reproduce and satisfy their appetites on the Scale, they may forage for other insect pests in the area. If you see signs or tabs posted on these trees, please leave them as they are. City Contractors will be returning to retrieve them.

Fostering interest in Nature (FiiN)

The City of Newport Beach recently completed the first year of the Fostering interest in Nature (FiiN) program. The FiiN program hosted 5th grade students from Title I schools in Orange County to participate in a 4-day, 3-night nature camp on the beaches of the Newport Back Bay. Two Hundred and Eighty students experienced FiiN over the course of nine weeks, enjoying activities including kayaking, orienteering, hiking, sleeping in tents, and exploring a science center. Schools were selected based on interest after an informational email was sent out to every principal in the Santa Ana and Newport-Mesa Unified School Districts. In future years, the program will expand to 10 weeks, with up to forty students attending each week.

FiiN began as an idea in 2015 when Coastal Commission required Lido House Project to allocate \$1.4 million (\$975,000 City and \$440,000 RD Olsen) to low-income accommodations or programs. The program is set to run for 10 years at current funding levels, with the hope to continue running long after that using potential funds from grants, sponsors, and donors. FiiN is offered at no cost to participants, making it accessible to students who otherwise would not be able to enjoy this unique experience.

The fifth annual Mayor's Egg Race was held Saturday, April 13 at the Civic Center. With approximately 1500 people and smiles it turned into a huge success. The community gathered to roll eggs with the Mayor, bounce around, ride in trains, walk for cupcakes, take pictures with the Bunny and more.

The event room is very busy with booked facility rentals daily during the week and weekends. Staff and customers are enjoying the new and improved look. DISCUSSION:

Patrick Papaccio contacted the City in November 2018 regarding his intent to request removal of the City Ficus tree due to view encroachment and sidewalk damage.

On April 18, 2019, the City Arborist inspected the City Ficus tree as a result of the removal request. The tree did not meet criteria for a Standard City tree removal. Staff suggested reforestation as an option for the applicant to remove and replace the tree per the criteria of view and hardscape problems referenced in the City Council Policy G-1. Mr. Papaccio has met the procedural requirements for the reforestation request of the City Ficus tree at 1521 Bayadere Terrace. If approved by the Commission, there will be a one-for-one replacement tree, 48" box Purple Orchid tree installed at the applicant's cost.



These medium-sized trees offer many landscape uses, shade, privacy and focal being some. Due to their deep-rooted nature, surface roots are arely an issue and allow the Purple Orchid tree to be planted nearly anywhere. While these trees may look delicate they are best planted in a full sun area

TITLE: Appeal of Denial of a Request for a Tree Removal – 720 Jasmine Avenue

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that PB&R Commission consider the appeal by John Buckingham of 720 Jasmine Avenue of the denial by staff for the removal of a City Sugar Gum tree.

DISCUSSION:

City Council Policy G-1, *Retention, Removal, and Maintenance of City Trees*, allows the PB&R Commission to act upon an appeal to remove Standard City trees. On July 12, 2018, property owner John Buckingham contacted the City to request the removal of a Sugar Gum tree in front of 720 Jasmine Avenue due to view encroachment and sidewalk damage.

The City Arborist inspected the tree on March 1, 2019 and determined the Gum tree is in healthy and stable condition and does not meet the criteria for removal referenced in the G-1 Policy. The City sidewalk is lifted likely due to the roots of the tree, which can be mitigated with root pruning/shaving and repair to the sidewalk, or the sidewalk could be ramped within ADA specifications to avoid any root pruning. Mr. Buckingham was informed and advised of the City Arborist's findings, and that he could appeal staff's decision to the PB&R Commission. Attached are the Tree Removal Review and Tree Inspection Report.






