Western Snowy Plover

- 34-58 grams, 5.9-6.6 inches
- Lifespan approx. 3 years
- Feeds on invertebrates in intertidal and sandy beach
- Predators include hawks, falcons, crows, raccoons, rats





History

- Federally listed as "threatened" 1993
- Began monitoring in 2009
- Fence installed 2011
- Coastal Development Permit to California Coastal Commission -2017
- Most recent submission to CCC July 2022


