They networked with Southwest's staff and talked about fleet modernization and discussed opportunities that would work for communities and the airline. The discussion focused on 1) utilizing more Max's; 2) reducing the number of Boeing 800s, and 3) looking at unique opportunities. This information was taken back to Southwest's network planning and scheduling team. Stranberg and Beale met with the Vice President of Network Planning and Director of Scheduling. The results are as follows: 1) through October, there will be 14 Max departures out of JWA, representing 26% of the departures. During that timeframe 2) Beginning in September and October the first three morning departures starting. will be Max's.; 3) In the 8, 9 and 10 a.m. timeframe there will be three more Max departures a day.
